An Interview with:

Ian Aitchison

Founder and former Chairman of Effective Aid International

Ian Aitchison and his wife Judy gave up a comfortable life in Australia's Gold Coast, where the trained pharmacist owned a successful pharmacy and moved to Thailand to start one of the most effective charities in North Thailand and Myanmar, aptly named Effective Aid International, which is also the

beneficiary of the Cyclists with Compassion charity rides. Ian recently retired from the chairmanship of EAI and after living more than 10 years in Thailand, Ian and his wife Judy moved back to Australia.

CWC: What inspired you to start EAI?

IAN: I started EAI when I was confronted by the desperate situation of the displaced people from Burma who were our world's longest term refugees, yet I had never heard of them. My wife and I wanted to tell the world about them, but also wanted to do something practical to assist them. Quality education seemed to be the single most effective way of changing their future.

CWC: You have spent more than 10 years of your life to help the displaced young people in the refugee camp, what were your major challenges?

IAN: Over the years we have been confronted by many challenges. These include gaining access to the young people we help, raising sufficient support, extremes in weather, language, understanding culture and negotiating our way through the obstacles placed in our way by local authorities.

CWC: How did you meet those challenges?

IAN: We overcame these challenges through dogged determination, selecting great leadership both here in Australia and on the ground at our project locations, plus keeping focused on a clearly defined vision.

CWC: What are the major improvements you have seen in the lives of the people you have helped in the refugee camps?

IAN: The change in both individual lives, as well as in the communities with whom we work, has been both immense and far reaching. We can never underestimate the empowerment brought through the delivery of quality education. It's not just about knowledge, but also the hope and vision that education, love and support bring to those participating in our projects.

CWC: Now you have retired from EAI, what do you hope EAI will achieve in the next 10 years?

IAN: While I have retired as Chairman of Effective Aid International, I remain an active board member and advisor. I look forward to being part of steering our education and community development programs into villages and communities within eastern Burma. Within the next 10 years I see significant high and primary schools established by EAI, as well as the relocation of our teacher training program into Burma, along with its expansion into training high school teachers as well as primary. I want to see rural communities prospering in a new and free Burma!

Cyclists With Compassion (CWC) is a group of like-minded cycling enthusiasts and was started with the goal to make a difference to underprivileged children in Asia by raising money for better education, which in turn will bring hope for a better, brighter future.

CWC plans and organises long-distance cycling tours to parts of Asia, raising awareness about the needs of children in these areas. Baan Fah Sighy was established more than 13 years ago by Australian Phil Hohnen and his Thai wife Wanida and has developed into an "oasis of love" for many abandoned and orphaned children who call it home and know it's founders as "Mum & Dad".

The Baan Fah Sighy Children Home is supported by Effective Aid International (EAI), our chosen beneficiary of the ride. For 15 years EAI (www.effectiveaid.org) has been changing the future for displaced, orphaned and abandoned children both in Northern Thailand and Myanmar. For EAI quality education is the single most effective weapon that can be used today, to erase poverty in the future - so education is their key focus. During these past years, EAI has provided more than 13,000 individual years of schooling to children in refugee camps, displaced peoples' villages and children's homes. EAI has employed, trained and empowered hundreds of refugees as teachers in their schools and have provided love, food, safety and shelter to abandoned and orphaned children.

Our ambitious plans can only become reality with the help and support from private and corporate sponsors and I would like to ask your kind support by becoming a sponsor of the CWC ride 2017.
